The importance of reading





- Reading is our priority (only second to keeping our children safe and happy).
- Reading supports children's personal development building confidence, empathy, curiosity, imagination.
- Reading is a gateway to wider learning across the curriculum.
- We aim for ALL children to love reading.
- This is especially important when, in the UK, children's reading for enjoyment is at an all-time low. 2026 will be The National Year of Reading.



What do we teach?





- Decoding (word reading)
- Comprehension (understanding the words)
- Fluency (reading accurately, quickly, with expression)
- Reading for Pleasure

These run alongside each other and are underpinned by talk.



A language-rich environment



- High quality interactions
- Daily Storytime and Rhymetime
- High quality texts
- Engaging play-based learning
 - revisit ideas and vocabulary from books
 - act out stories and rhymes
 - child-led reading and mark making





Phonological Awareness



The ability to identify the sounds within spoken words.

- Rhyme
- Alliteration
- Syllables
- Phonemes

Sing rhymes.
Share rhyming stories.
Play rhyming games and 'Fred Talk' games.



If children know eight **nursery rhymes** by the time they are 4, they are usually among the **best readers** by the time they are 8.'




















Reading at Home



- Use real books
- Read aloud together (keep going throughout their school life!)
- Make it cosy
- Let your child choose (revisit old favourites, allow 'easy' reads, comics/magazines)
- Keep books in easy reach
- Be a reading role model let children see you reading (for work or for pleasure!)



Learning the relationship between letters and the spoken sounds they represent.

e.g. mat has 3 sounds: m-a-t, sheep also has 3 sounds: sh-ee-p English is one of the most complex alphabetic codes in the world: 26 letters, 44 speech sounds, over 150 different ways of writing those 44 sounds!

Children learn how to read and write each sound.



Do not teach your child the letter names (the alphabet) yet!



What is Phonics?



Learning the skills of segmenting and blending.

- **Segmenting:** breaking a word down into individual sounds. In Read Write Inc Phonics, this is called **'Fred Talk'**.
- Blending: merging sounds together to read the whole word.






What do children learn in Phonics?





Reception children focus on Set 1 sounds (highlighted in grey).

They typically begin learning Set 2 sounds in the Summer term.







What do children learn in Phonics?



Phonetically **regular** words are known in Read Write Inc as **'green words'**.



Phonetically **irregular** words. In Read Write Inc these are 'red words'.





Demonstration lesson: Introducing a new letter sound







Typical path through Read Write Inc Phonics in Reception
















Learning single letter sounds and oral blending.

Knows single letter sounds AND can orally blend (if adult says m-a-t, they say mat).

Ditty sheets: Can read short words (e.g. red, in). Learning Set 1 special friends (sh, th, ch, qu, ng, nk).

Red Ditty Books: can read all Set 1 sounds and words with those sounds (e.g. ship, chat).


By end of Reception: Green or Purple Storybooks. Now learning Set 2 sounds. Reading longer words (4 or 5 sounds e.g. jump, stomp). Reading some short words 'at a glance' (e.g. can, got).



Home reading



- Keep sharing real books and rhymes together
- Watch the Virtual Classroom Videos (shared in Fetcham Freelancer each week).
- When it's time, listen to your child read their Read Write Inc book or sheet.











Each child is on their own reading journey!

Try not to compare with friends or siblings.

We will give targeted support in school if needed at any point.
